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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS FOR THE DANE COUNTY DRUG COURT TREATMENT PROGRAM

December 31, 2005

As of December, 2005, the total number of participants enrolled in the DCTP since its inception (June 1996): 869.

As of December 31, 2005, there were 57 active participants in the Treatment Track, 8 active participants in the Educational Track and 2 active participants in the Extended Monitoring Track.

As of December 31, 2005, the total number of graduates since June 1996: 502

Successful completion rate: As of December 31, 2005, there had been 502 graduations, 84 neutral discharges, and 217 terminations. **This is a 70 % successful completion rate.** (Total Number of Graduates Divided by Total Admissions minus Total Active Cases plus Total Neutral Dropouts or $502/869 - (67+84) = 502/719 = 69.9$ or 70%). According to the US Government Accounting Office (2005), the average completion rate for drug courts **nationally is 46%.**

Recidivism: As of December 31, 2001, a total of 161 graduates had been out of the program for 12-48 months. Of those, 39 were re-arrested. One-hundred twenty-two (122) or 76% had not been re-arrested. **The recidivism rate is calculated to be 24%.**

By Comparison, among an equivalent group comprised of 99 participants who did not graduate from the program (non-completers), 53 persons have been re-arrested for a recidivism rate of **54%**. Among an additional comparison group comprised of 155 individuals who were referred to the program by the DA's Office and determined to be eligible, but declined to participate (decliners), 69 persons were re-arrested for a recidivism rate of **45%**.

New Criminal Arrests: The average number of new criminal arrests per DCTP graduate (who graduated 12-36 months ago as of December 31, 2001) is calculated as 0.42 (68/161). By comparison, it is 1.28 for non-completers (127/99), and 1.04 for decliners (161/155). **The average number of new criminal arrests per offender is 67% lower for DCTP graduates than for non-completers and 60% lower than decliners.**

Average Costs: The per person costs for 2003 for both out-patient treatment and education services averaged \$927. **78% of DCTP participants receive out-patient treatment or education services.** Case-management services (drug-testing, monitoring, and assistance with ancillary services) average \$1658 per person. The cost of residential treatment services averages \$4092 (Utilized by approximately 17% of DCTP participants). Day Treatment services account for the remaining 5% of DCTP participants with a cost averaging \$2,925 per person. **The per diem rate for DCTP participants for 2003 is estimated at \$17.78 (\$504,240 total program cost divided by 28,350 participant days (105 participants at 270 days each)).** In 2002 the per diem for a jail stay was estimated at \$60.41.

Referral and Admission: As of December 31, 2005, the number of referrals (1323) in light of the number of admissions (869) is significant. 36% of Caucasian referrals (391 of 1084) dropped out or were subsequently withdrawn, while 50% of African American referrals (135 of 271) dropped out or were withdrawn. Of the 1323 referrals, 869 or **65% were admitted.** 454 or **38% were not admitted.** **Of the 454 not admitted, 78 or 17% were "No Shows,"** 42, or 9% were awaiting screening or assessment, 148, or **33% were withdrawn due to program requirements** (residency, new charges, inappropriate referrals or charges, mental illness, previous enrollment, new police information, non-cooperation), and 194 or **43% either declined to participate, dropped out or obtained another disposition.** In summary, of the total number of referrals (1323), and controlling for those awaiting screening or assessment (42), 869, or about **68% were admitted;** 272 or about **21% were either "No Shows" or voluntarily declined to participate,** and 148 or about **12% were withdrawn due to program requirements.**

Types of Cases: The types of cases referred to the DCTP are for increasingly more serious offenses. In 1999, 88% of referrals were for possession cases (drug or paraphernalia), while by December 31, 2005, possession cases represented just 66% of all referrals. Accordingly, **cases charged with prescription fraud, theft, possession with intent to deliver, burglary, and forgery, (all felonies) have increased 191% (from 12% to 28.5% between 1999 and 2003) and now represent 33% of 2005 referrals.**

- As of December 31, 2005 of 688 DCTP participants admitted to and discharged from drug treatment (1999-2005):
 - **38% (262) obtained** either full or part time **employment**
 - **29% (201) remained in, enrolled in or graduated from** high school/GED, college or vocational **educational programs**
 - **61% (418) were able to retain their employment**
 - There was a **85% decrease in unemployment**
 - **18 drug-free babies were born resulting in savings in medical and human service costs.**
 - **15 parents became reunited with their minor children** resulting in savings in current and possibly future public welfare and human service costs
 - **21 parents resumed child support payments**
 - **14 parents became current with child support payments**
 - **39 parents continued child support payments** all resulting in potential savings in public welfare, human service and medical cost savings
 - **20 W-2 recipients participated** in intensive drug treatment in the DCTP enabling self-sufficiency and resulting in public welfare, human service and medical cost savings.


- As of December, 2005, the total number of participants enrolled in the DCTP since its inception (June 1996): 869.
- As of December 31, 2005, there were 57 active participants in the Treatment Track, 8 active participants in the Educational Track and 2 active participants in the Extended Monitoring Track.
- As of December 31, 2005, the total number of graduates since June 1996: 502
- **Successful completion rate:** As of December 31, 2005, there had been 502 graduations, 84 neutral discharges, and 217 terminations. **This is a 70 % successful completion rate.** (Total Number of Graduates Divided by Total Admissions minus Total Active Cases plus Total Neutral Dropouts or $502/869 - (67+84) = 502/719 = 69.9$ or 70%). According to the US Government Accounting Office (2005), the average completion rate for drug courts nationally is 46%.
- **Recidivism:** As of December 31, 2001, a total of 161 graduates had been out of the program for 12-48 months. Of those, 39 were re-arrested. One-hundred twenty-two (122) or 76% had not been re-arrested. **The recidivism rate is calculated to be 24%.**
- **By Comparison,** among an equivalent group comprised of 99 participants who did not graduate from the program (non-completers), 53 persons have been re-arrested for a recidivism rate of 54%. Among an additional comparison group comprised of 155 individuals who were referred to the program by the DA's Office and determined to be eligible, but declined to participate (decliners), 69 persons were re-arrested for a recidivism rate of 45%.
- **New Criminal Arrests:** The average number of new criminal arrests per DCTP graduate (who graduated 12-36 months ago as of December 31, 2001) is calculated as 0.42 (68/161). By comparison, it is 1.28 for non-completers (127/99), and 1.04 for decliners (161/155). **The average number of new criminal arrests per offender is 67% lower for DCTP graduates than for non-completers and 60% lower than decliners.**
- **Average Costs:** The per person costs for 2003 for both out-patient treatment and education services averaged \$927. **78% of DCTP participants receive out-patient treatment or education services.** Case-management services (drug-testing, monitoring, and assistance with ancillary services) average \$1658 per person. The cost of residential treatment services averages \$4092 (Utilized by approximately 17% of DCTP participants). Day Treatment services account for the remaining 5% of DCTP participants with a cost averaging \$2,925 per person. **The per diem rate for DCTP participants for 2003 is estimated at \$17.78 (\$504,240 total program cost divided by 28,350 participant days (105 participants at 270 days each)).** In 2002 the per diem for a jail stay was estimated at \$60.41.
- **Referral and Admission:** As of December 31, 2005, the number of referrals (1323) in light of the number of admissions (869) is significant. 36% of Caucasian referrals (391 of 1084) dropped out or were subsequently withdrawn, while 50% of African American referrals (135 of 271) dropped out or were withdrawn. Of the 1323 referrals, 869 or 65% were admitted. 454 or 38% were not admitted. Of the 454 not admitted, 78 or 17% were "No Shows," 42, or 9% were awaiting screening or assessment, 148, or 33% were withdrawn due to program requirements (residency, new charges, inappropriate referrals or charges, mental illness, previous enrollment, new police information, non-cooperation), and 194 or 43% either declined to participate, dropped out or obtained another disposition. In summary, of the total number of referrals (1323), and controlling for those awaiting screening or assessment (42), 869, or about 68% were admitted; 272 or about 21% were either "No Shows" or voluntarily declined to participate, and 148 or about 12% were withdrawn due to program requirements.
- **Types of Cases:** The types of cases referred to the DCTP are for increasingly more serious offenses. In 1999, 88% of referrals were for possession cases (drug or paraphernalia), while by December 31, 2005, possession cases represented just 66% of all referrals. Accordingly, cases charged with prescription fraud, theft, possession with intent to deliver, burglary, and forgery, (all felonies) have increased 191% (from 12% to 28.5% between 1999 and 2003) and now represent 33% of 2005 referrals.

- As of December 31, 2005 of 688 DCTP participants admitted to and discharged from drug treatment (1999-2005):
 - **38% (262) obtained** either full or part time **employment**
 - **29% (201) remained in, enrolled in or graduated from** high school/GED, college or vocational **educational programs**
 - **61% (418) were able to retain their employment**
 - There was a **85% decrease in unemployment**
 - **18 drug-free babies were born resulting in savings in medical and human service costs.**
 - **15 parents became reunited with their minor children** resulting in savings in current and possibly future public welfare and human service costs
 - **21 parents resumed child support payments**
 - **14 parents became current with child support payments**
 - **39 parents continued child support payments** all resulting in potential savings in public welfare, human service and medical cost savings
 - **20 W-2 recipients participated** in intensive drug treatment in the DCTP enabling self-sufficiency and resulting in public welfare, human service and medical cost savings.


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16. Three-Year Post Arrest Recidivism All Participants & Comparison Group	17.


Growth in DCTP Referrals Over Time




Types of DCTP Cases Over Time




DCTP Admissions by Track '96-2005




DCTP Admissions by Age '96-2005



DCTP Admissions by Race '96-2005






DCTP Admissions by Sex '96-2005






Service Utilization 2003 & 2005




Successful Completion Rate December 2005




Successful Completions June 1996-December 2005


Rates of Recidivism for DCTP Graduates and Comparison Groups



As of December 31, 2001, a total of 161 graduates had been out of the program for 12-48 months. Of those 39 were re-arrested. One-hundred twenty-two (122) or 76% had not been re-arrested. **The recidivism rate is calculated to be 24%.**

By comparison, among an equivalent group comprised of 99 participants who did not graduate from the program (non-completers), 53 persons have been re-arrested for a recidivism rate of **54%**. Among an additional comparison groups comprised of 155 individuals who were referred to the program by the DA's Office and determined to be eligible, but declined to participate, 69 persons were re-arrested for a recidivism rate of **45%**.


All three groups represented a 100% sample of their respective populations with the caveat of not including 2001 graduates (reasoning here is that the inclusion of graduates who had been out of the program for less than a year, would dilute the averaged recidivism statistic for graduates. It was a widely used device to try to "raise the yardstick" so to speak, for drug courts). Statewide CCAP data were collected and summarized for criminal arrests (misdemeanor and felony), arrests involving alcohol offenses and arrests involving criminal traffic charges, for all study participants. Data were subsequently entered and analyzed in SPSS (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences).



These are 100% samples of Graduates, Non-Completers and Decliners referred to the program between 1996 and 2001. Graduates included in this analysis had been out of the program 12-48 months. There were 161 graduates, 99 Non-Completers, and 155 Decliners. Data were collected through the end of 2001.


- The average number of jail days sentenced to a DCTP grad was 8.4
- The average number of jail days sentenced to a Non-Completer was 94.2
- The average number of jail days sentenced to a Decliner was 72.5

- The average number of prison days sentenced to a DCTP grad was 0
- The average number of prison days sentenced to a Non-Completer was 52.6
- The average number of prison days sentenced to a Decliner was 79.03



- As of Dec. 31, 2001, a total of 51 graduates had been out of the program for 3 years or 36 months (1998 graduates). Re-arrest data were collected through 2001. Of those graduates, 10 were re-arrested during that time for a recidivism rate of 24%.
- There were 26 non-completers who had been out of the program for 3 years (discharged 1998/data collected through 2001). 17 were re-arrested for a recidivism rate of 65%.
- There were 31 decliners whose re-arrests could be studied for three years following their initial arrests (initial arrests being those that brought about referral to the DCTP in 1998). 19 of these decliners were re-arrested for a recidivism rate of 61%.

3-Year Post Arrest Recidivism All Participants & Comparison Group



- As of December 31, 2001 a total of 77 DCTP participants (graduates and non-completers) were examined for their three years post arrest re-arrest rate. There were a total of 27 re-arrested for a recidivism rate of **35%**.
- As comparison, there were a total of 31 offenders who had declined program participation during this same 3-year post arrest period. Of these, 19 were re-arrested for a **61%** recidivism rate.
- There was a **42%** reduction in the rates of recidivism among DCTP participants relative to the comparison group.
- These figures compare favorably to reductions in recidivism found among NY drug courts. From the 2003 Rempel et al.study, reductions ranged from **13% to 47%**. (**Average reduction = 29%**).

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DRUG TREATMENT COURT PROGRAM-BASIC INFORMATION

The Drug Treatment Court Program is a deferred prosecution program. Program eligibility requirements include Dane County residency, minimum age of 18 years and no history of violence. It is a voluntary program. Cases are referred to the Drug Treatment Court Program by the District Attorney's office. The District Attorney specifies the length of time the participant will be required to participate in the program.

The goal of the program is to assist participants to establish and maintain abstinence from alcohol and controlled substances. There are two separate tracks, the **treatment track** and the **educational track**. The treatment track is provided for individuals who experience problems as a result of alcohol and/or controlled substance use and or abuse. The educational track is provided for individuals without such a demonstrated history or pattern. There are three separate phases to the program for treatment track participants and two separate phases to the program for educational track participants.

I. Court Component-all participants are expected and required to attend court review sessions when their case is scheduled. At the court review hearing, each participant's case scheduled for that day will be heard. One by one participants come before the judge and discuss their case. Participants are expected to remain in the courtroom and listen to all of the review hearings scheduled for that day. After all of the review hearings are completed, the collective group is dismissed from court by the judge. This process usually takes about two hours. The Drug Treatment Court reviews are usually scheduled Thursday mornings at 9 am (starting 1/1/06).

After the court reviews are completed, new pleas are then entered. Participants who are represented by an attorney must have their attorney present on the day of the plea hearing. Participants sign a contract on the day the plea is entered in court. The contract will specify the length of time the participant will be in the program, the outcome of the case if the participant successfully completes the program and other important rules and requirements of the program. The date an individual enters their plea in the Drug Treatment Court program is the beginning date of their entry into the program.

Court review hearings are scheduled every two weeks for about the first three months. If a participant is doing well, court review hearings are lengthened to once every three weeks and finally, once every four weeks. If problems arise in a case, the court will schedule court review hearings on a weekly basis.

TREATMENT TRACK

II(a). Treatment Component-participants enrolled in the Treatment Track must meet specific program requirements. Those requirements could include any or all of the following: weekly individual sessions with an AODA therapist; weekly group attendance; completion of an intensive out-patient treatment program; attendance in aftercare meetings and residential treatment.

III(a). Case Management Component-participants enrolled in the Treatment Track are required to have daily contact with the case management office during the first few months they are in the

program. Participants must sign in daily and if requested, submit to urinalysis. They must meet with their case manager a minimum of once a week for counseling. Urinalyses are taken on a frequent, random basis. After the first three months, the check-in schedule may be reduced depending on the participant's progress in treatment.

EDUCATIONAL TRACK

II(b). Brief Intervention Program-participants enrolled in the Brief Intervention Program are required to attend educational sessions at PICADA. The core educational program consists of a series of three group meetings, two hours in length scheduled one night a week for three consecutive weeks. Approximately two months after the core program, a "booster" session is scheduled which consists of one meeting at PICADA for about 2 hours. Attendance and completion of these groups is mandatory.

III(b). Case Management Component-participants enrolled in the Educational Track will be monitored by the Drug Court Coordinator located in the City-County Building, Alternatives to Incarceration Program, Room GR-4. Participants will be required to provide random urinalysis at this location. Participants are called by 8 a.m., Monday through Friday and advised if they are required to provide a UA for that day. Participants must provide a UA that day at any time up to 4:15 p.m. The Drug Court Coordinator will meet with participants to provide counseling and referrals as needed.

SCREENING

After a case is referred to the Drug Treatment Court Program, the individual will be screened by the Drug Court Coordinator, located in the City-County Building, Alternative to Incarceration Program, Room GR-4. The screening interview lasts approximately one half hour. During the screening interview, the individual will be required to provide basic information about themselves, their juvenile history, adult arrests and convictions. They will also complete a basic AODA screening instrument.

ASSESSMENT

Upon completion of the screening appointment, the individual will either be referred to the Mental Health Center of Dane County for a comprehensive AODA assessment or to PICADA for further assessment. The assessments completed by the Mental Health Center of Dane County last three hours. They are conducted at the Clinical Assessment Unit located at 702 W. Main,

Madison, WI; telephone number: 280-2652. Upon completion of the assessment, individuals will be advised of the type of treatment they will be required to complete if they enter the Drug Treatment Court Program. If the individual is deemed inappropriate for the treatment track, their case is automatically referred to the education track. **No further assessment is required.**

The assessments completed by PICADA will last one half to one hour and are conducted at 2000 Fordem Avenue, Madison, WI; telephone number 246-7606. Upon completion of the assessment, the individual will be advised if they are appropriate for the educational track. If the individual is deemed inappropriate for the educational track, they are referred to the Mental Health Center of Dane County for further assessment. Upon completion of the interview, an appointment will be made for further assessment at the Mental Health Center of Dane County.

The completed assessment is forwarded to the court. The court will schedule a plea hearing date for official entry into the Drug Treatment Court Program.

MISSION

The Dane County Circuit Court, Civil Division, recognizes that a majority of crimes committed in Dane County are committed by people with substance abuse problems. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

First missed UA during last 3 months of contract—extend contract one week. Second or subsequent missed UA during last 3 months of contract—extend contract for 3 months from date of missed UA.

Missed treatment, check-in or case management meeting.

These will not automatically be grounds for denying graduation so long as treatment is successfully completed. Other sanctions will be used for missed check-ins, treatment and case management. Court reserves discretion to determine whether contract has been successfully completed so as to entitle defendant to graduate.

Complete primary course of treatment.

Defendant must complete primary course of treatment required by case manager. This may include commencement of aftercare. Many defendants will be involved in continuing individual therapy, participation in aftercare or regular attendance at support groups at the time of graduation. Completion of treatment includes making progress on case plan goals which, in addition to AODA treatment may include: legal, employment, education, financial/money management, housing, medical, mental health, family/relationships/domestic violence, community support/recreation and spirituality.

GUIDELINES FOR SANCTIONS

These sanctions are established with the following goals in mind:

1. To maintain the integrity of Drug Court as a firm dispositional alternative;
2. To minimize subjective evaluation of violations;
3. To foster fairness and consistency in the application of sanctions;
4. To sustain accountability for participants;
5. To create predictability in the imposition of sanctions, and in turn, greater deterrence of future violations; and
6. To retain flexibility in determining sanctions without detracting from the above stated goals of firmness, fairness, accountability and predictability.

SANCTIONS

Sanctions which may be used:

- One night jail
- Two nights in jail
- Weekends in jail
- Extend contract
- Increase frequency of court attendance
- Individually Tailored Sanctions

Case management, treatment personnel, the prosecutor and the court will try to use sanctions which are incremental from one violation to the next and also to use sanctions designed to focus on meeting particular treatment goals. Such sanctions may be suggested by case managers or treatment personnel, and also by the Drug Court participant whose behavior is at issue.

Note: Case management and treatment providers may also respond to violations with increasing frequency of required UAs and/or meetings and/or increasing intensity of treatment.

Sanctions may be imposed for:

- Using alcohol or controlled substances
- Missing UA
- Missing treatment
- Missing case management
- Missing check-in
- Missing court
- Behavior inconsistent with a commitment to meeting drug court goals
- New Arrests

New Arrests

The following will result in *termination* from the program:

- Arrest on probable cause for a felony
(Termination is discretionary if felony is a simple possession of controlled substance);
- Arrest on probable cause for a violent misdemeanor;
- Arrest for the second time during the program for OWI/BAC or for an OWI/BAC 3rd offense as defined by the law;
- Arrest for any aggravated operating while intoxicated charge (e.g. causing injury or death, with a minor passenger, etc.)

Defendant who is arrested for a 1st or 2nd offense OWI/BAC one time while in the program or a non-violent misdemeanor *may* be permitted to remain in the program after evaluation of all of the circumstances. If permitted to remain in the

program, other sanctions may be imposed and those arrested for OWI/BAC may be required to attend a Victim Impact Panel.

Defendant arrested on probable cause for drug manufacture or delivery or possession with intent to deliver will be removed from the program. However if the defendant pleads guilty or no contest to simple possession within 6 weeks of the arrest for new offense, termination from program is discretionary

Tampering with Drug-Testing

Tampering with urine or interfering with drug testing, including ingesting substances in an attempt to alter the result, putting something in the urine, providing a sample that is not urine or not from the person being tested or in any other manner is a very serious offense. Success in Drug Court Treatment Program depends on a relationship of trust among staff and participants, and participants are expected to be honest and truthful in their interactions with DCTP personnel. Therefore tampering offenses will result in termination from the program.

Use violation defined:

A single use of alcohol, controlled substance, or a prescription medication prescribed for another, obtained by fraud or doctor shopping, or in violation of a drug contract counts as one violation. Use occurring before Drug Court entry which is evidenced after entry counts as one violation. Use of a prescription medication prescribed for the participant by a doctor is not a violation if staff is informed of the prescription immediately and approves the drug's use and the prescription is for a legitimate medical condition. Positive drug tests showing declining levels occurring without new usage since the last address of same by the court do not constitute an additional violation.

2. That if I successfully complete this contract, my charges will be disposed as follows:

 - c. Tardiness or failure to appear for court, a UA or BA, a case management meeting, a check-in or treatment appointment;
 - d. Refusal to take a chemical test;
 - e. Falsifying or attempting to falsify a drug test;
 - f. Being charged with a new criminal offense or failing to report a new arrest to my case manager;
 - g. Failing to report to case management any prescribed medication that I am taking;
 - h. Failing to report any change of address to the Court and case management;
 - i. Possession of weapons;
 - j. Failure to maintain full time employment, education or combination thereof, if I am not disabled;
 - k. Not being honest about my drug or alcohol use;
 - l. Engaging in any threatening or assaultive behavior towards staff or other participants;
 - m. Violating any other requirement expressly imposed by the Court or case management.

5. That revocation of my bail as a sanction will be imposed forthwith unless I present a compelling reason for delay and that such revocation of bail is without Huber privileges;
6. That I waive the right to confidentiality of my treatment records obtained in connection with the Drug Court program and agree to communication of same to and between my treatment providers, the Court, the District Attorney's Office, my defense attorney, my probation agent, if any, and the Drug Court Coordinator;
7. That information relevant to my progress and participation in treatment may be discussed in open court and that statements I make in court or to treatment providers are for treatment and not for any other purpose including use in an other criminal proceeding or investigation in which I am either a potential witness or suspect, and that in all other respects my treatment records will be kept confidential;
8. That if I am terminated from Drug Court, such records or statements may, however, be used at sentencing on this case;
9. That I may rescind my waiver of confidentiality at any time and that if I do so before successful completion of this contract, I will be terminated from Drug Court;
10. That after completion of this contract, successfully or unsuccessfully, the Court will seal the above treatment records and court reports;
11. That the waiver of confidentiality of my treatment records is limited to the length of this contract;
12. That I waive the right to a due process hearing, confrontation and cross-examination of witnesses, use of subpoenas, and appeal with respect to a determination by the Court of a program or contract violation;
13. That I waive the right to dispute the findings of any laboratory reports submitted to the Court;
14. That repeated contract violations may result in a jail sanction as described above, extension of my contract, termination from the program, or such other sanctions as the Court deems appropriate;
15. That to graduate from the program, I must remain drug and alcohol free for a minimum of three months prior to graduation.



Dane County Bail Monitoring Program (BMP)

On this program, persons have been legally charged with crimes and are pending trial. They are not convicted. Persons with all levels and seriousness of charges can be on Bail Monitoring to include misdemeanor and felony cases. The judge has given them the option to agree to Bail Monitoring supervision in lieu of cash bail or for a reduced cash bail.

BMP clients must be assessed by ATIP. Their character and connections to the community are verified and then they must be accepted by ATIP staff, before they are released from jail. They are under court ordered bail conditions to comply with rules. Failure to comply with BMP rules and bail conditions can result in their termination from the BMP and their reinstatement of cash bail and their return to the Dane County Jail. BMP can also impose additional rules as a condition of their release.

BMP Eligibility

- Defendant must have been in Dane County Jail for 72 hours.
- Defendant cannot have a probation/parole hold, detainer from another jurisdiction, or a commitment/sentence to serve. If they do, they cannot be released from jail.
- Defendant must have the ability to secure a suitable and verifiable residence.
- Defendant must voluntarily agree to participate with the rules/requirements of BMP and to comply with all other court orders and conditions of bail.

Minimum Bail Monitoring Supervision Requirements

- One face-to-face contact per week.
- Two phone contacts per week.
- Verifiable and suitable residence.
- No alcohol and/or drug use. Defendant will be subject to random urinalysis to screen for controlled substances.
- Defendant will be informed about upcoming court appearance.
- Verification of employment, if any.

Other Possible Bail Monitoring Supervision Requirements

- No contact with victim(s).
- Referral for counseling, alcohol/drug assessment and/or treatment.
- No unsupervised contact with minors.
- Order to seek employment, job training or continue with school.
- Geographical restrictions.
- Random phone contacts at staff discretion.
- Electronic monitoring - for all or part of the release.
- Curfews
- Other requirements by Order of the Court or BMP staff.

Miscellaneous Bail Monitoring Functions

- Monitoring defendants pending misdemeanor appeal.
- Monitoring a witness when there are concerns they will not appear for court hearings.
- Supervise defendants with a cognitive or mental health disability to ensure that he/she takes their medication and makes all court appearances.
- Verify statements made by defendant in court that may affect bail.
- Verify work, housing and/or length of residency or any other factor regarding defendant's bail.

Dane County Domestic Violence Bail Monitoring Program (DVBMP)

This program is almost identical to the BMP Program. The eligibility and supervision criteria are the same in almost every way. The only difference is that the DVBMP program evaluates and supervises individuals charged with Domestic Battery or Domestic Disorderly Conduct.

Dane County Electronic Monitoring Program (EMP)

The Electronic Monitoring Program (EMP) is the Dane County Circuit Court's home monitoring bracelet program. These clients have been convicted of different criminal charges, which can be traffic misdemeanors, and felonies. These defendants are sentenced to EMP in lieu of doing jail time. Some cases the defendants are eligible for all of their time on EMP and in other circumstances they are required to do some time in jail. The defendant's monitoring can vary from days to one year depending on their sentence. On EMP, the defendants are restricted to their home unless approved by the EMP supervisor. Approved appointments include work, medical appointments, legal appointments, etc. Accountability and compliance with EMP rules are the primary goals of this program. The equipment relays information whenever the defendant leaves their residence whether approved or not. The system uses the telephone to transmit this information. Therefore, the line must be free of all features. A defendant may be sentenced to EMP "when eligible." In this case, the defendant would be eligible when they have met the basic eligibility criteria. Referrals are initiated by minute sheets provided by the Clerk of Courts or by the defense attorney. If a minute sheet is not received, we have no way of knowing that the referral exists.

Basic EMP Eligibility Criteria

- Defendant must have a satisfactory behavior record in the jail.
- Defendant must have a verifiable and suitable residence with a telephone.
- Defendant must have verifiable employment, school or childcare duties. An exception to this would be a verifiable disability.
- Defendant must contribute to the cost of the program. The standard fee is \$10.00 per day. (There is a sliding scale fee for individuals who receive SSI, SS or W2). The first month must be paid in advance.

EMP Rules & Requirements

- One face-to-face contact in the ATIP office per week.

- Maintain phone line with no telephone service options unless approved by ATIP.
- Maintain all curfews and schedules established by the ATIP staff. This includes the defendant keeping the ATIP office informed of his/her whereabouts at all times.
- The defendant shall avoid all conduct that violates federal and state statutes, municipal or county ordinances or which is not in the best interest of public welfare.
- The defendant shall not use or possess any controlled substance or alcohol.
- The defendant shall not enter the premise of a bar or tavern.
- The defendant shall continue to make agreed payments to contribute to the cost of the program. The defendant will be required to make bi-weekly payments.

IF THE DEFENDANT VIOLATES ANY OF THE ABOVE IT MAY RESULT IN THEIR RETURN TO THE DANE COUNTY JAIL TO SERVE THE REMAINDER OF THEIR SENTENCE. PREPAYMENTS ARE NOT REFUNDABLE.

ATIP - Treatment Alternative Sentences

ATIP supervision is a creative sentencing option that is available to the court system. This may include supervising someone with an AODA or mental health treatment need. We ensure that they complete a treatment regime in lieu of a jail sentence. This can be for a portion of the sentence or in some cases the entire sentence can be stayed. Random urinalysis will be done to ensure abstinence. Regular office visits are also required during the term of supervision.

It is recommended that a specific duration and intensity of supervision and treatment be ordered to ensure that the defendant meets the requirements intended by the court. If in lieu of Treatment Alternative Program (TAP) alternative, we recommend the defendant be supervised for a minimum of six months.

Drug Treatment Court Program

The Drug Treatment Court Program is a voluntary, deferred prosecution program involving intervention, treatment and rehabilitation of non-violent drug offenders who desire to break the cycle of drug dependency. Referrals are made by the District Attorney's Office, who recommends the length of the program. Participants must be 18 years old, a resident of Dane County and have no prior history of violence.

- Participation in the program is from 9 to 12 months.
- Participants must remain clean and sober from alcohol and controlled substances to successfully complete the program.
- Participants will receive an assessment to determine the appropriate drug treatment program.
- Participants must comply with all of the components of the drug treatment program.
- Participants are required to attend court review hearings on a regular basis through out the duration of the program.

Benefits of the Program

- Successful completion of the program will result in a favorable disposition of the criminal case and graduation from the program.
- Participants will be clean, sober and have improved health.

Q. *What benefits does the Deferred Prosecution Program offer victims, participants, the community, and law enforcement agencies?*

- A.**
- Where programs of this nature do not exist, offenders receive little or no supervision and they have no access to resources and services following arrest.
 - Courts and police benefit from the elimination of costly court fees and time spent in appearances for court trials, hearings, and pretrial conferences.
 - Taxpayers benefit from reduced court costs. National studies reveal that the cost of handling cases through Pre-Trial Intervention Programs such as this one is less than half the cost of handling similar cases in the traditional manner of prosecution.
 - Victims who suffer personal property and monetary loss are compensated by the offender through restitution or community service.





Q. What is the Deferred Prosecution Program of the Dane County District Attorney's Office?

A. The program is one in which eligible persons can divert out of the formal criminal court process. Participants sign a contract by which they agree to attend classes, make restitution, engage in community restitution work, secure needed psychiatric, alcohol and/or drug, vocational or other counseling. They agree to take other appropriate measures to assure that they do not repeat their criminal behavior. In return for the successful completion of the program, the District Attorney's Office agrees not to proceed with prosecution.

The public benefits from the reduction in recidivism, the monetary restitution and community service work received, and also the savings of court time and resources. The participants benefit from the education and counseling received, as well as the avoidance of a criminal conviction.

Q. What is the length of the contract?

A. The length of the offender's contract depends on the nature and seriousness of the offense, his or her attitude, commitment and educational or counseling needs. Contracts average from 9 to 36 months.

Q. Who is eligible for participation in the Deferred Prosecution Program?

- A.** To participate in the program, an offender must:
- Have no previous criminal conviction or record. However, exceptions can be made on a case by case basis.
 - Be 17 years of age or older or be waived from juvenile jurisdiction, if under 17.
 - Have consent of the Assistant District Attorney assigned to the case.
 - Accept responsibility for the offense. (Admission of guilt may not be used against the offender in a criminal court of law.)
 - Voluntarily agree to participate in the program.

Meet with a member of the program staff for a personal interview to determine eligibility for participation in the program.

The Deferred Prosecution Program charges a fee for service. No cash will be accepted. Only money orders or cashier's checks made out to:

Q. Can an offender be dropped from the program?

A. YES! An offender's contract terminates if he/she fails to adhere to any of the set conditions in the contract or he/she becomes involved in any criminal violations, excluding minor traffic violations, during the contract period.

If the contract terminates before completion of the program, the District Attorney usually resumes criminal court proceedings. This may result in a criminal conviction.

Q. How is Deferred Prosecution different from Probation?

A. A defendant placed on probation is found guilty by the judge or jury, or pleads guilty to a charge and is sentenced. Probation involves formal supervision and results in a criminal conviction.

An offender in the Deferred Prosecution Program is not sentenced although a plea is usually entered. An offender enters the program voluntarily. Any offender may elect to go to court rather than participate in the program. In addition, supervision of an offender under the Deferred Prosecution contract is provided by an intake counselor on an informal basis. The offender must follow through and meet the deadlines in his/her contract. If the offender completes the contract, the case is dismissed.



OTHER CONTRACT CONDITIONS:

If you violate the terms of this contract or if new information becomes available concerning this offense, the Dane County District Attorney may, during the period of deferred prosecution: (1) revoke or modify, add or delete conditions of this deferred prosecution contract to include changing the period of deferral or, (2) prosecute you for this offense. If a decision is made to terminate you from the program, you may follow the grievance procedure, which is provided to you at the time you sign the contract. Automatic termination from the program WILL occur and the grievance procedure WILL NOT apply to the following: If you engage in conduct which creates probable cause to believe you have committed a crime; if you are currently on supervision for criminal charges or if you fail to comply with any requirement of the treatment program. Whether you have failed the treatment program will be decided by the treatment provider and no one else. If you comply with the contract conditions, either the charge(s) against you will be dismissed or no criminal prosecution will be instituted as a result of this offense.

DEFERRED PROSECUTION UNIT GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

The Deferred Prosecution Unit (DPU) acts under the authority of the Dane County District Attorney. This program is committed to the preservation of and compliance with your legal rights.

EXCEPTIONS TO THE GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE ARE GROUNDS FOR IMMEDIATE TERMINATION FROM THE PROGRAM:

- If you engage in conduct that creates probable cause to believe you have committed a crime.
- If you are currently on supervision for criminal charges.
- If you fail to comply with any requirement of the treatment program. Whether you have failed the treatment program will be decided by the treatment provider and no one else.

NON-COMPLIANCE WITH CONTRACT

If you sign a contract and fail to follow through with the agreed upon conditions, the following procedures will be followed by this program:

- (1) You will be sent a warning letter by your assigned counselor, which will outline your non-compliance. This letter will ask you to appear for a case review appointment. If the conflict is resolved, you will receive a letter summarizing the issues discussed and the agreed upon steps which will be taken to complete the contract within the program.
- (2) If you do not appear for the scheduled appointment and/or we are unable at the appointment to resolve the dispute over your contract, you will receive a letter stating you are to be terminated from the program.

APPEAL TO THE DIRECTOR

If you do not agree with the counselor's decision to terminate you from the Deferred Prosecution Program, you may appeal that decision by following the procedures outlined below:

- (1) Contact the Deferred Prosecution Office at 284-6896 within five (5) working days of the date of the "pending termination" letter. Ask to set up an appointment with the Director of the program. Tell the person who answers the telephone that you wish to meet with the Director to discuss the "pending termination" letter you have received.

- (2) Meet with the Director as scheduled. At this meeting you should be prepared to discuss why you should not be terminated from the program, and what you will need to do to comply with the conditions of your contract.
- (3) The Director of the Deferred Prosecution Program will review your file and your appeal. Again, every attempt will be made to resolve this issue with you at this meeting.
- (4) You will receive a written decision within five (5) working days outlining your meeting with the Director.

IF YOU FAIL TO RESPOND TO THE WARNING LETTER OR THE PENDING TERMINATION LETTER, YOUR CONTRACT WILL BE TERMINATED AND YOUR CASE WILL BE SENT BACK TO COURT FOR FURTHER PROCEEDINGS.

APPEAL TO THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY

If, after hearing from the Director of the Deferred Prosecution Unit you are not satisfied with the Director's decision, you may appeal that decision by writing a letter or statement within five (5) working days. 

Mission:

The Deferred Prosecution Program exists under the authority of the District Attorney as an alternative to prosecution and sentencing. The supervision of the offenders through contractual agreements and referrals to community resources will promote positive changes in behavior and attitudes and reduce recidivism and give deserving individuals opportunities to not have criminal convictions. This program operates with the commitment to safety of the victims and the community as a priority. This program collects monetary restitution for victims and provides restitution to the community through offender's performance of community service.

Description:

The Deferred Prosecution Program is staffed with 6 FTE's which include the director, three counselors, a community service coordinator and an office manager/clerk IV. Volunteer staff include one or two student interns at a time who assist the counselors and the office manager. The number of cases referred to the program each year is approximately 1000. There are over 600 active cases throughout the year. The case breakdown fluctuates and is currently as follows: 10% retail thefts; 43% domestic abuse related crimes; 47% all other crimes. An offender is referred to the program by being diverted out of the court system by the district attorney. If assessed as appropriate for the program, the offender signs a contract which focuses on a course of action to assure the person will not repeat the criminal behavior. In return for successful completion of the program, the Court agrees to dismiss the case. If the participant does not fulfill the contract, the contract is terminated and the offender is returned to court for further proceedings. In 2001, 20,412 hours of community service were completed by program participants. Also, in 2001 the program collected over \$95,430.00 in restitution for victims medical expenses, property damage, and financial losses.



Program Overview

Victim Offender Conferencing (VOC), has been a service of Youth Services of Southern Wisconsin, Inc., since 1997. Victim Offender Conferencing offers a meaningful role for victims in the juvenile justice process while holding juvenile offenders accountable for their behavior. Victims and offenders meet with a neutral facilitator and talk about the impact of the youth's crime. Victim participation is completely voluntary. Offender participation may be voluntary, but is sometimes required by the court if the victim is interested. About 53% of all youth referred to VOC are also involved in other agency services.

In cases where the victim decides not to meet with the juvenile offender, a referral is made to the VOC Accountability Group. The goal of this group is to foster victim empathy and help juveniles understand the impact of their behavior. Youth who attend this group meet with volunteers from the community to discuss the impact of crime. The youth are also required to write a letter of apology to victims of their offense and read it to the group.

Victim impact panels are another alternative available when the actual victim of a crime is not available to meet with the offender. In partnership with Dane County Department of Human Services, VOC offers a monthly victim impact panel for retail theft offenders. Panel members include deputies from the Dane County Sheriff's Department and employees from Movie Gallery, Target, Marshall Field, Shopko and Stop-N-Go Stores. The youth meet as a group with the panel members to discuss their shoplifting offenses. Panel members talk about how they are personally affected by shoplifting and about how retail theft affects the community. Other victim impact panels can be created as needed to address specific offenses, i.e., arson or possession of drugs.



Program Principles

- * The key customer in the process is the victim.
- * *Victim Offender Conferencing* should be available at varying points in the juvenile justice process.
- * Volunteer facilitators for the program should reflect the diversity of those we serve.
- * Participation by victims is purely *voluntary*. Participation by offenders should be as voluntary as possible, but participation may be ordered by the court or expected by others.
- * The outcomes of conferencing sessions are not predetermined. Rather, they are determined by the participants.
- * Evaluation of the effectiveness of the program and conferences should be based first on victim satisfaction, then other measures.

VOC JUVENILE REFERRALS BY COURT STATUS





VOC REFERRALS BY OFFENSE




Referrals by Gender:

VOC Volunteers

Volunteers are critical to the success of this service. A six-month commitment is requested from potential volunteers. Some volunteers have been with the program since 1997. Volunteers are trained to be conference facilitators, group facilitators, or members of a victim impact panel. Training is provided by staff and veteran volunteers who are skilled in the process.

Community volunteers come from a variety of backgrounds. These include education, human services, corrections, law enforcement, legal, mental health, and private sector business. The annual value of volunteer time to the program is over \$6,000.00.

Program Overview

Community Peer Court (CPC) is an alternative to the traditional juvenile justice system. The program offers eligible youth an opportunity to receive a meaningful sanction from a jury of their peers. Practices used in Community Peer Court are based on the Balanced Approach to Restorative Justice philosophy.

Community Peer Court is for first-time offenders between the ages of 12 and 16, who have pled guilty to ordinance violations such as theft, damage to property or disorderly conduct. High School students serve as volunteer jurors, and community members sit on an advisory board for the court.

Cases are referred to CPC by the Municipal Court. Community Peer Court is a voluntary program and the youth must enter a guilty or no contest plea prior to participation. Following the youth's court session, offenders have 90 days to complete their sentence requirements. If the sentence is completed to the satisfaction of the court, the juvenile does not have to pay a fine and they will not have a municipal court conviction record. In 2005, the program served Sun Prairie, Cottage Grove and DeForest/Windsor.



Program Operations

Each Peer Court program is tailored to meet the needs of the community in which it operates. Steering committees made up of representatives from each community meet regularly with the Program Coordinator. The purpose of the committee is to review program and community needs, evaluate outcomes and provide guidance for program activities. Referrals to Community Peer Court are made after eligible juveniles enter a guilty or no contest plea in municipal court. Once the CPC coordinator screens a referral, the youth is scheduled for the next available court date. Currently, each municipality makes referrals to Peer Court monthly.

Each case takes approximately 15 minutes for the CPC jury to process. All terms of the sentence are handed out and explained in an agreement signed before the defendant leaves court. Criteria used by the jury in determining a sentence include: the abilities of the defendant, the needs and rights of the victim, and whether or not the sentence promotes positive youth development. The defendant then has 90 days to complete the sentence with progress toward completion monitored by the Peer Court Coordinator. In the event that a defendant does not complete the sentence, he/she is referred back to the Municipal Court Judge for disposition in the traditional municipal court system.

Sentencing Results

Peer Court volunteers are provided with guidelines for sentencing by the Municipal Court Judge and the Program Coordinator. However, they are also encouraged to be creative and to individualize each sentence. During 2005, there were 218 different sentence activities imposed. Outcomes from some of these sentencees included 170 hours of community service, 45 apology letters, 9 AODA evaluations, and 92 essays written about a variety of topics related to the offenses.




Type of Offenses



CPC Volunteers

Volunteers are critical to the success of this program. CPC requests a one-year commitment from potential volunteers. Recruited from the high schools of the participating communities, youth volunteers receive 6-8 hours of jury member training. Subject matters discussed during training include the principals of Balanced and Restorative Justice, cultural competency/awareness, confidentiality, and sentencing options. Volunteers also participate in a mock trials. Training is provided by YSOSW staff and other professionals from the community.

Program Evaluation

Each juvenile is given an anonymous evaluation to complete. After completion 100% of the participants stated that they were satisfied with their Peer Court experience in 2005. Following their 90 days of informal supervision, none of the participants who responded had re-offended, and all stated that they felt their Peer Court experience helped them become more responsible community members.
