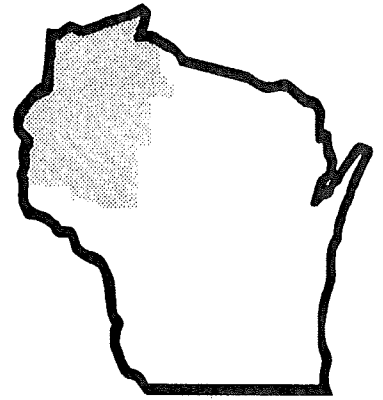


Dear Chief Justice Roggensack and Director Koschnick:

Pursuant to the Wisconsin Supreme Court's order dated May 22, 2020, attached please find a copy of Rusk County's operating plan to resume in-person court proceedings and an operating plan for jury trials with attachments as well my order approving same. The effective date of the both plans is June 8 when the first scheduled jury trial to be conducted in Rusk County will be held consistent with the requirements of the plan. The date by which Rusk County intends to set non-essential in-person proceedings is July 1, 2020, although the court will continue to make all reasonable efforts to conduct proceedings remotely after that date.

The Rusk County Circuit Court and Clerk of Court began actively working on these plans in early May and, given that a fellow Barron County judge is conducting the first trial in Rusk, I was aware early on of the effort, time and resources expended in support of the plans.

**ORDER APPROVING OPERATIONAL PLAN FOR THE SAFE RESUMPTION OF
IN PERSON PROCEEDINGS AND JURY TRIALS IN RUSK COUNTY**

WHEREAS: The Wisconsin Supreme Court in light of the COVID 19 Statewide and National states of emergency has entered certain orders related to the operations of the Circuit Court regarding in person appearances and jury trials.

WHEREAS: On March 22, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ordered that although the courts of the State of Wisconsin remain open, all civil and criminal jury trials scheduled to begin before May 22, 2020 are to continued and rescheduled by the assigned judge to a date after May 22, 2020;

WHEREAS: On March 22, 2020, and as amended on April 15, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court suspended, until further order of the court, most in-person hearings in the circuit courts, subject to exceptions for certain matters, including those approved by the chief judges of each district, if remote technology is not practicable or adequate to protect constitutional rights of the citizens of Wisconsin;

WHEREAS: On March 31, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court issued Interim Rule 20-02 which suspended statutory deadlines for conducting non-criminal jury trials until further order of the court:

WHEREAS: On May 22, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ordered that March 22, 2020 order regarding the suspension of jury trials, that Interim Rule 20-02 regarding suspension of deadlines for non-criminal jury trials, and the April 15, 2020 amended order regarding remote hearings, are extended for each circuit court until that circuit shall have prepared an operational plan for the safe resumption of in-person proceedings and jury trials and the plan shall have been approved by the chief judge of the applicable administrative district;

WHEREAS: On May 22, 2020, the Wisconsin Supreme Court outlined the specific criteria required in each circuit court operational plan as to how that circuit court will conduct in-person proceedings and jury trials so as to reduce to the greatest extent possible the risk of transmission of the virus causes COVID-19 and that promotes the health and safety of all those present in the courtrooms, jury rooms, and other court-related confined spaces of that circuit court;

WHEREAS: On June 5, 2020, the Honorable Steven P. Anderson, Circuit Judge of Rusk County, submitted operational plans regarding resumption of jury trials and regarding resumption of in-person proceedings, both of which contain a statement


regarding communication with local justice partners regarding the safe resumption of in-person proceedings and jury trials in that circuit court; a requirement that all persons who are present in the courtrooms, jury rooms, and other court-related confined spaces shall wear face coverings, except as authorized on the record by said judge; outlines practices for appropriate sanitation/hygiene of frequently touched surfaces and the hands of participants; specify that notices regarding face coverings and availability of hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes/sprays in court-related areas will be appropriately posted and noticed; and incorporate many recommendations made in the Final Report of the Chief Justice's Task Force;

THEREFORE IT IS ORDERED:

The operational plans of the Circuit Court of Rusk County regarding procedures and practices for conducting jury trials and other in-person proceedings during the 2020 public health emergency and pandemic-COVID 19 are hereby approved and are effective June 8, 2020. All previous orders identified in the May 22, 2020 order of the Wisconsin Supreme Court cease to apply to the Circuit Court of Rusk County and that circuit court must continue to follow its operational plans as approved by the chief judge until further notice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the provisions of this order shall be subject to further modification or termination by future orders.

COVID-19 Circuit Court Operating Plan for Rusk County

Recognizing the need to ensure the health and safety of litigants, attorneys, visitors, court staff, judges, and other individuals entering the buildings housing the courts, the courts of **Rusk** County will implement the following protective measures:

General

1. Planning for reopening Rusk County Circuit Court began in early May. Judge Steven P. Anderson and Clerk of Court Lori Gorsegner have met on an almost daily basis working on ideas and strategies to safely resume in person appearances. Judge Anderson and Clerk Gorsegner consulted with the Rusk County Public Health Officer, Emergency Management Director Thomas Hall and County Administrator Andy Albarado on several occasions regarding safe practices for staff and visitors to the Government Center. Judge Anderson and Clerk Gorsegner personally consulted with the Sheriff, District Attorney, Public Defender, court commissioner, and County Administrator. The planning culminated in a Zoom meeting on June 4, 2020, with the following justice partners to discuss and consider the recommendations outlined in the Wisconsin COVID- 19 Task Force report:

2. The judge will use all reasonable efforts to conduct proceedings remotely.
3. Before calendaring in-person hearings, the court will have adequate staff and will have procured personal protective equipment and sanitation supplies necessary.
4. The Court will continue to maintain communication with the Rusk County Public Health Officer and Rusk County Office of Emergency Management and will adjust this operating plan as necessary with any changes in the public health conditions in the county.
5. The Judge may begin setting non-essential in-person proceedings no sooner than July 1, 2020

Judge and Court Staff Health

1. Judges and court staff who can perform the essential functions of their job remotely will do so, whenever necessary.
2. The Judges and Court Staff will follow Rusk County Public Health guidelines.
3. Judges and court staff will be required to wear face coverings in the courtrooms, jury rooms and confined court-related spaces. They will practice social distancing and appropriate hand hygiene as recommended by the CDC.

4. Protective Measures: hand sanitizer and face coverings are provided and cleaning of courtroom and clerk of court's office is completed several times throughout the day.

Scheduling

1. The following court schedules are established to reduce occupancy in the court building:
The judge will continue to use zoom and telephone hearings as much as possible.

Vulnerable Populations

1. Individuals who are over age 65 and individuals with serious underlying health conditions, such as high blood pressure, chronic lung disease, diabetes, obesity, asthma, and those whose immune systems are compromised such as by chemotherapy for cancer or other conditions requiring such therapy are considered to be vulnerable populations.
2. Each judge will include information on orders setting hearings, dockets notices, and in other communications notifying individuals who are in vulnerable populations of the ability to contact the court to identify themselves as a vulnerable individual and receive accommodations.
3. Vulnerable populations who are scheduled for court will be accommodated by using zoom video or telephone.

Social Distancing

1. All persons not from the same household who are permitted in the court building will be required to maintain adequate social distancing of at least 6 feet.
2. No more than two individuals not from the same household will be permitted in an elevator. If more than one individual from the same household is in an elevator, no other individuals will be permitted in the elevator.
3. The third floor of the Government Center and court system has no breakrooms and snack rooms.

Gallery

4. The maximum number of persons permitted in the gallery of each courtroom has been determined and posted at 12. The maximum capacity of the courtroom will be monitored and enforced by court staff.
5. The gallery of the courtroom has been marked to identify appropriate social distancing in the seating.

Well

6. In each courtroom, the counsel tables, witness stand, judge's bench, and clerk, court reporter, and bailiff seating have been arranged in such a way so that there is social distancing of at least 6 feet between each space.

Hygiene

1. Hand sanitizer dispensers have been placed at the entrances to the building, inside of each courtroom, and inside of bathrooms.
2. Notices regarding the availability of hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes/spray will be posted at the entrance of each courtroom and court-related confined space.
3. Disinfectant wipes or spray have been placed at counsel tables, at the witness stand, at the jury box, and on the judge's bench.
4. CDC flyers outlining appropriate hygiene, social distancing, or public safety have been posted in multiple locations on each floor of the court building.

Screening

1. Rusk County has no security screening at the main entrance. However, for jury trials health screening will be performed at the main (east) entrance as set forth in the Jury Trial Plan and social distancing and face covering requirements will be enforced by Court Security.

Face Coverings


1. All members of the public entering the Rusk County Government Center are strongly encouraged to wear face coverings at all times.
2. All persons present in the Courtrooms, jury rooms and court-related confined spaces shall wear face coverings. A witness will be required to wear a mask until they sit in the witness stand. The witness stand is surrounded in Plexiglas so when testifying the witness may remove his/her mask. After the witness is released from the witness stand they shall put their face covering back on until they leave the courtroom. Notices regarding this requirement will be posted at the entrance of each courtroom, jury room and court-related confined space and will state that this requirement will be enforced by the judge.
3. Individuals may bring face coverings with them, but if the individual does not have a face covering, a disposable face mask will be provided by court staff.
4. Individuals who will be required to be in the court building for a judicial proceeding will be provided face coverings and required to wear them while in the court.

Cleaning

1. Rusk County cleaning staff will clean the common areas of the court building so that common spaces are cleaned at least every day and will be disinfected by mist.
2. Rusk County cleaning staff will clean the courtrooms-at the end of each day the courtroom is used and will be disinfected by mist.
3. Rusk County continuously runs the HVAC system.
4. Rusk County cleaning staff have been provided cleaning supplies shown to be effective with this coronavirus.


5. Rusk County cleaning staff have been trained on proper cleaning techniques and provided appropriate personal protective equipment.
6. Cleaning wipes or cleaning spray and paper towels will be provided at counsel tables and anyone using the table will need to clean before and after each use.

COVID-19 Circuit Court Operating Plan for Rusk County Addendum: Jury Trial Plan

As an addendum to the Operating Plan filed with the Chief Judge of the Judicial District on June 5, 2020, this plan is developed to ensure the health and safety of jurors, litigants, attorneys, visitors, court staff, judges, and other individuals participating in jury trials. The courts of Rusk County will implement the following additional protective measures related to jury trials:

Recovery Planning and General Education

1. Planning for reopening Rusk County Circuit Court began in early May. Judge Steven P. Anderson and Clerk of Court Lori Gorsegner met on an almost daily basis working on ideas and strategies to safely resume in person appearances. They also began ordering facemasks and sanitary supplies in late May and early June so that they were available for a July 1, 2020 start date. Judge Anderson and Clerk Gorsegner consulted with the Public Health, Emergency Management Director and County Administrator on several occasions regarding safe practices for staff and visitors to the Government Center. Judge Anderson personally consulted with the Court Commissioner, Sheriff, District Attorney, Public Defender, and Administrative Coordinator. This planning culminated in a Zoom meeting on June 4, 2020, with the following justice partners:

2. The following efforts have been undertaken to educate the general public on the importance of jury service and the specific precautions taken in the county with respect to public safety and ensuring the safety of jurors during the pandemic: Notice sent to Jurors outlining safety procedures; there will be a news release about the plan and it will be posted on the Rusk County website; no group jury orientation; Individual pads and pens for jurors to keep; no communal food or drink; lunches and snacks delivered in individual containers; using two courtrooms and the county board room by Zoom to do jury selection; using jury box and gallery during trial to social distance jurors; using large courtroom to do jury deliberations as there is a bathroom near and allows for social distancing. The jurors have an assigned seats to prevent contamination. Jurors will be taken outside by bailiffs for breaks.

Summoning Jurors

1. Considerations have been made for the safety and wellbeing of jurors. The attached letters were developed and will be sent with the juror summons to each juror.
2. The Clerk of Court and judge are using liberal deferral and excusal of jurors.
3. The following protective measures, including expedited entrance into the courthouse, check-in that minimizes physical contact with documents, posting notice regarding hygiene and distancing practices, are in place for jurors who report to court: court personnel will call jurors who are waiting in their vehicles in the parking lot when it is their time to sign in. An Emergency Medical Technician will conduct health screening questions and temperature check. Individuals who indicate yes to any of the health questions or have a temperature above 100.4 degrees F will be refused admittance to the Government Center. No record will be kept of the health screening or temperature checks. The screening process will occur outside in the parking lot on the east side of the Government Center.


Juror Attendance and Safe Participation

1. Personal protective equipment will be available to the jurors, including masks, gloves, and hand sanitizer.
2. Social distancing of jurors will be enforced through the following strategies: limiting the capacity in the courtroom, marking off spaces 6 ft. apart within the courtroom and jury box, reconfiguring placement of counsel tables, court reporter, witness stand, and/or bench, using an alternate courtroom for additional capacity, installing Plexiglas shields for witness stand.
3. The following strategies will be used to reduce the number of people required to report for jury selection: Utilize preselection questionnaires, conduct voir dire in sessions based on the capacity of the court room that will allow appropriate social distancing, broadcast jury selection and limit or eliminate spectators in the courtroom, utilize 6-person juries upon stipulation.
4. After the jury has been empaneled, the following efforts have been made to accommodate social distancing, but ensure that each juror has adequate sight lines to the witness stand and can hear and see all proceedings. Examples of such accommodations include: use of technology and video monitors to increase site lines, and handling of exhibits. Documented efforts: portable document cameras (Elmos) will be used at each counsel table for all exhibits pre-marked by the attorneys, which will then be displayed on the large screen facing the jury and the litigants. Hard copy exhibits can be filed with the Clerk of Court office for electronic filing.
5. Social distancing consideration during trial breaks and deliberations include reconfiguration of the deliberation room, using an alternate room for deliberations, hand sanitizing and bathroom capacity, availability of refreshments: Rusk County will use the large courtroom which can accommodate the jurors for deliberations. We will allow the jurors to eat lunch in the gallery of the main courtroom and in the jury room where there are bathrooms. We will split the jury for breaks

during the trial to accommodate social distancing. Individual lunches and snacks will be ordered and distributed, only bottled water and pop will be provided.


6. The court will attempt to prioritize jury trials during the COVID 19 public health emergency and as usual will take into consideration the nature of the cases, the extent to which the cases involve liberty interests, cases with time limitations, victim's rights and input, and the length of time a case has been pending.
7. Rusk County can only accommodate one jury trial per day, so there is no need to enter order in regard to scheduling.
8. Due to capacity issues within the courtroom, the following accommodations will be given for public view of the proceedings: if members of the public cannot be accommodated due to the number of those attending, the court will use courtroom two with sound and sight to stream and also the County Board Room if necessary.

Safety measures have been implemented to keep you safe during your jury service.

- Masks or face coverings are required to be worn by everyone entering the Government Center for this trial. Please bring your own mask or face covering with you. If you don't have one, we will provide you with one. You will also be provided with your own pen and gloves to wear if you wish.
- Courtrooms and public spaces are regularly disinfected.
- We have modified our usual procedures for jury selection and service so that social distancing is enforced. Jurors will be spaced apart throughout the courtrooms and county board room.
- Beverages are NOT allowed in the courtrooms and a communal coffee pot will NOT be available. Bottled water and soda WILL be provided.
- If you haven't signed up for text or email notifications, please do so now by calling (715) 532-2108. Due to the pandemic there will be NO jury orientation.
- **PLEASE REPORT TO THE MAIN ENTRANCE OF THE GOVERNMENT CENTER (East door).** An EMT will be at the door to ask a few basic health questions and to take your temperature. The Clerk will be there to sign you in and direct you to the appropriate area.
